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Nepal-US Trade: Challenges and Opportunity

On June 11, 2025, the Nepal-USA Chamber of Commerce and Industry (NUSACCI), in collaboration with the Garment Association Nepal (GAN) and the Nepal Carpet Manufacturers and Exporters Association (NCMEA), organized a significant half-day interaction on "Nepal-US Trade: Opportunity and Challenges" at Hotel Dusit Princess, Kathmandu. The core objective was to engage key stakeholders in evaluating the implications of the recent U.S. tariff policy declared on April 2, 2025, and the subsequent 90-day pause initiated on April 9. The program sought to generate insights and recommendations to the Government of Nepal (GoN) in future trade negotiations with USA.

The chief guest of the program was Hon. Damodar Bhandari, Minister of Industry, Commerce and Supplies. The program was chaired by Mr. Kiran P. Saakha, President, NUSACCI.

Pashupati Dev Pandey, President, GAN, delivered welcome remarks, emphasized Nepal's trade scenario with the U.S., which is its major trade partner after India. U.S.-bound exports account for 11% of Nepal's total exports. With the Trade and Investment Framework Agreement (TIFA) active and the Nepal Trade Preference Program (NTPP) nearing expiry in December 2025, the interaction focused on challenges and opportunity posed by the new reciprocal U.S. tariffs.

Mr. Kiran P. Saakha, President of NUSACCI, highlighted the program theme and stated the need for Nepal to use the 90-day pause as a window for proactive dialogue with the U.S. government, stressing that Nepal's marginal trade deficit with US in 2024 does not suffice reciprocal tariffs. Mr. Saakha highlighted the April 2 Executive Order by U.S. President Donald J. Trump that invoked the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA) and National Emergencies Act to implement reciprocal tariffs. Citing examples like U.S.-India negotiations over value addition criteria, he recommended Nepal develop an appropriate strategy to negotiate with US. He also stressed for renewal of NTPP which is due to expire in December 2025 and inclusion of fast moving such as garments, felt, and shoes which NUSACCI has been strongly advocating.

Mr. Saakha also raised the issue of transshipment as this was witnessed during the boom period of garment exports to USA. He also requested GON for the fulfilment of commitment made in the TIFA Council Meeting held in Kathmandu last year. USA has been raising concerns regarding IPR protections, issue of trademark related to international company and counterfeited labels. This need to be duly addressed by GON.

Dr. Paras Kharel, Executive Director of SAWTEE, presented a detailed paper titled "Nepal-US Trade in Uncertain Times." He analyzed global trade disruptions following geopolitical tensions and the April 2025 U.S. Executive Order ("Liberation Day"), which imposed 10–30% tariffs on many countries, including Nepal. Nepal, which once held a trade surplus with the U.S. (2003–2018), has experienced a deficit since 2019. Key exports like carpets and felt (58%), agriculture (19%), and garments (9.2%) are all affected. With the expiration of the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) and uncertainty around the NTPP, almost all exports now face additional duties.

Dr. Kharel opined that the new tariffs could reduce Nepal's U.S. exports by 2%, and that only 13% of Nepal's export potential is currently tapped through NTPP. He recommended prioritizing products with Revealed Comparative Advantage (RCA) and diversifying exports beyond traditional goods. He also urged Nepal to prepare appropriate trade strategies to deal with the tariff issue, promote bilateral trade agreements, and engage diplomatically as over 70 countries are already negotiating with the U.S.

Dr. Yuba Raj Khatiwada, Economic and Development Advisor to the Prime

Minister, stated that non-reciprocal tariffs should be Nepal's focus, given its size and upcoming LDC graduation in 2026. He advocated for a Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT) to attract American FDI and improve Nepal's position in value chains. Dr. Khatiwada also highlighted the need for inter-agency collaboration and compliance with FATF guidelines to improve trade facilitation and exit the grey list.

Dr. Bal Ram Gurung, NCMEA President, reflected on the carpet industry's historical significance and present challenges due to the likely shift from zero tariff to 10% tariff, which poses a significant challenge for carpet manufacturers and exporters.

The representatives from exportoriented commodity associations shared their views on the U.S. tariff policy. Mr. Naresh Lal Shrestha, President of the Nepal Wool Felt Producers' Association, highlighted the high production and shipping costs—approximately \$2,000 and 15 days to reach the Calcutta port—and called for a revision of the Nepal Trade Preference Program (NTPP) list to better reflect Nepal's current export potential. Mr. Kiran Kumar Dongol, President of the Nepal Handmade Paper Association, whose exports to the U.S. constitute 50-60% of total volume, advocated for lobbying efforts to reduce current tariffs of 1.6–5.5%, noting that competing countries like the Philippines and Thailand face only 0.1%. He justified this by pointing to the high value addition, eco-friendliness, and cultural uniqueness of Nepalese handmade paper. Mr. Deepak Prakash Banskota of the Himalayan Orthodox Tea Producers Association noted that while the U.S. is a relatively small market for their tea, exports to Europe remain stable and largely unaffected. Mr. Resham Pokharel, President of the Dog Chew Association, emphasized the global success of Himalayan Dog Chews, which support 20,000 farmers, and U.S. tariffs ranging from 0-10% pose challenges despite the product's quality and non-competitive nature in the U.S. market. Lastly, Mr. Rudra Neupane, President of the Footwear Manufacturers' Association, pointed to the heavy 47% total duty on shoe exports to the U.S. He urged the need to differentiate between natural fiber and leather products and raised concerns over piracy—especially in the garment sector—calling for immediate government intervention and policy support.

Govinda Prasad Ghimire, President of FEEN, outlined key strategies to boost Nepal's export potential. He stressed focusing on two to three priority areas like premium-quality production and market linkages. Traceability, especially for indigenous products, was highlighted as crucial for gaining international credibility. He emphasized the value of collective trademarks in branding Nepal's unique offerings globally. These efforts aim to make Nepali products more competitive in the international market.

Birendra Raj Pandey, Senior Vice President of the Confederation of Nepalese Industries (CNI), highlighted the complex geo-political environment Nepal currently faces and emphasized the need to honor commitments under the Trade and Investment Framework Agreement (TIFA). He proposed organizing trade fairs and B2B meetings as strategic solutions to emerging challenges, signaling CNI's commitment to actively support such initiatives for fostering sustainable trade partnerships. Santosh Pandey, Vice President of the Nepal Chamber of Commerce (NCC), echoed the urgency of expanding Nepal's exports to the U.S., recalling a past boom in readymade garment exports as proof of potential. He stressed the need to effectively harness current opportunities to ensure long-term gains for Nepalese producers and exporters.

Meanwhile, Hem Raj Dhakal, Vice President (Commodity) of FNCCI, acknowledged government support for special economic zones (SEZs) and highlighted recent foreign direct



investment in garment industries in Bhairahawa and Simara. He recommended appointing trade experts in Nepal's embassies and proposed the creation of a special desk to monitor U.S. trade developments. Anjan Shrestha, Senior Vice President of FNCCI, emphasized the importance of U.S. tariff policy and economic diplomacy in enhancing trade relations. He advocated for unified national branding through a collective trademark, and urged attention to transit and freight logistics while calling for a constructive review of reciprocal tariffs to strengthen bilateral trade.

Hon Minister Damodar Bhandari, the Chief Guest, emphasized

economic diplomacy, internal policy reforms, and fostering public-private collaboration. He assured that some private sector concerns have been addressed in the new budget and committed to continued cooperation.

Former Secretary Purusottam Ojha reaffirmed Nepal's need for non-reciprocal arrangements, as its exports are negligible in global terms. He stressed enhancing value-added niche products, like herbal and aromatic goods, and aligning IPR laws with global norms. He recommended reactivating TIFA mechanisms for regular trade dialogue.

Dr. Prakash Kumar Shrestha, National Planning Commission Issue: 2

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Member, called for impact assessments, inter-ministerial coordination, and strategic global engagement, warning that vague statements risk weakening trade positions. Hon. Ganesh Parajuli, Member of Parliament, emphasized improving governance and resolving payment-related issues, particularly in light of Nepal's FATF grey listing.

The event concluded with closing remarks and a vote of thanks from Dawa Sherpa, Senior VP of NCMEA. He reiterated the challenges posed by U.S. tariffs and called for government incentives, better tax policies, and a unified approach to trade promotion. He thanked all participants and

underscored the need to strengthen Ease of Doing Business in Nepal.

Overall, the interaction reflected that Nepal must act swiftly, strategically, and collectively to address the challenges, optimize its U.S. market presence focusing on value added goods, and turn current challenges into long-term opportunities through diplomatic engagement, internal reform, and private sector collaboration. The interaction program was attended by GON representatives, FNCCI, CNI and NCC representatives, FEEN, Commodity Associations representatives, experts, members of NUSACCI, GAN, NCMEA and
